playground or in the Hope North gym, where all PE classes will be held, remains to be seen.

Heit said that the middle school is estimated to grow by around 10% by the time school starts back up in September, although it's still too early to make completely accurate estimates. The maximum number of students per class will likely remain the same as it is now, which is twenty-eight kids. If the number of students increases enough, there may be two smaller classes per grade.
