Hope Student Council officers and representatives are leading the charge for the school Thanksgiving food drive. Last year, collected 155 lbs. of food to replenish the Hope church food pantry. Treats for Charity collected 184lbs of candy this year that will be distributed to the Senior Center and Birthday Dreams. On December 7th, the council will serve hot chocolate at the Junction Hometown Holiday's Christmas Tree Lighting, to more than 700 people free of charge. Any donations collected will be given to the charity organizations that the council votes on.

For the holiday season, Hope School is providing Christmas gifts for families through our Giving Tree. Each class has adopted a family to support.

We are also preparing for LEST (Lutheran Elementary Schools Tournament), coming February 13-15 at Pacific Lutheran University. Students compete in fine arts, writing, drama, Knowledge Bowl, basketball, swimming, math, science, Lego Robotics, Rubik's cube and bowling, a new competition added last year. However, we cannot forget that it also marks the end of our Fall sports season. We had two sports competing this Fall, Girls Volleyball and Co-Ed Cross Country. Both made enormous strides, working hard and improving over the course of their respective seasons.

Cross Country: Led by new coach Manuel Alba, the team was comprised of mostly younger first-time runners. Eager to improve themselves, they often ran hard during their practices so that they could place higher in our league meets. At our League Championship meet, the team placed fourth. The team was consistently paced by runners Henry (6th), Siena (5th), Bryson (8th), Edison (5th), and Eli (5th) during the season. I am thrilled to see this team grow together and place even higher in the coming years! Special congratulations to Siena for placing fourth for girls at the League Championship meet.

Volleyball: Led by veteran coaches Jen Rice and Sally Heit and newcomer, Jessica Esses, the school saw a record 21 girls turn out for the team! Split almost evenly down the middle between 7/8th grade and 5/6th grade, we formed two complete teams during the season.

Our 7/8th grade team was a veteran group this year with many of the girls having played for the school for the past 3-4 years. Their experience showed as the team took second place in the Peace





Lutheran Invitational. Their season record reflected how good they were throughout the season as they came together to be a true team, learning their strengths and weaknesses and supporting each other during the course of the season. Led by 8th graders Eve and Kayla, along with 7th graders Issabella and newcomer Remy, the volleyball team placed fourth in the League's Championship Tournament.

The 5/6th grade team was a mix of new players (some whom had never played volleyball ever) and returning players. They competed hard and learned a lot of the essential building blocks of how to play volleyball during the season, which will lay the groundwork for them to continue to grow even further next season!
